#### **Open Meeting**

#### Opening Comments/Pledge of Allegiance

David Pennington started the meeting at 9:08 am with the pledge of allegiance.

#### **Roll Call/Introductions**

Attendees took turns introducing themselves.

#### **Approval of Consent Agenda**

Fire motioned to approve the agenda and meeting minutes. LEPC seconded the motion. It passed unanimously.

#### **Committee Reports**

#### Exercise/Training Report

Melissa announced that she will be leaving Taney County EMA on July 31<sup>st</sup> and will no longer serve as the lead for this committee. David Pennington thanked her for her service and all of the help she has provided to the RHSOC over the years.

#### **Old Business**

#### **SHSP Procurement Updates**

Thomas Cunningham provided purchasing updates for FY21 and FY22.

Springfield Fire received funding in FY22 to purchase a bomb squad robot. However, this robot is no longer purchasable. The funds from this project will be reallocated to a Springfield Fire Structure Collapse project to purchase an HSRRS response vehicle. This Structure Collapse project was originally approved for FY22 funding by our region, but Springfield Fire agreed to withdraw any immediate funding requests in order to fully fund other projects. This is the normal process we follow where we transfer savings from one project to another in need.

Finally, Thomas reminded the RHSOC that SMCOG contractually "split" with MSU, so we will no longer be prepurchasing equipment. Grant recipients must go through their normal purchasing process. SMCOG recommends you send the details of your purchases to SMCOG first just so we can make sure that it will be approved. If you purchase something that is not approved, you will not be reimbursed for it.

#### **Inventory Disbursement Requests**

Jasper County Sheriff intends to release their Comm Vehicle that was purchased with RHSOC funds. A notification was sent to all RHSOC contacts that any organizations within our region are eligible to apply for the vehicle. We received three applications — Central Crossing Fire Protection District, Springfield Fire, and Stone County. David Pennington recused himself from this discussion to avoid any conflicts of interest. Thomas Cunningham led the discussion. The RHSOC reviewed the three proposals and discussed the merits of each, including how it will be used, location of the vehicle within the region (Greene County EMA also has a comm vehicle kept in Springfield), and how it will be loaned to regional organizations if the need arises. 911 (Mike Lawton) motioned to vote for Stone County to be awarded the vehicle. County Commission (Tim Selvey) seconded the motion. The motion passed with 11 yes, 2 no, and 1 abstain. Thomas will work with Stone County and Jasper County to finalize the details of the transfer.

#### **New Business**

#### FY23 Project Review

A discussion was held regarding all FY23 project applications. Region D received \$1,300,3889.42 in applications, but our award amount was \$472,601.11, so cuts had to be made. We reviewed each application (starting with the highest scored) and noted if it was a "sustain" or "build" project, what equipment or training was requested, how much the total request was, how well it lined up with regional goals, and if the project should be approved for full, partial, or no funding. Once we discussed each project in detail, individual votes were held to determine funding approval. The following table provides details on the approved projects. It was decided that savings from any projects would be shifted to other approved projects.

## SEMA Quarterly Regional Meeting Missouri Department of Agriculture Update

**Foreign Animal Disease (FAD) Preparedness and Response**: African Swine Fever virus, Foot & Mouth Disease virus and High Pathogenic Avian Influenza virus are three major viruses circulating in the world that could devastate the Missouri poultry and livestock industries. MDA is continuing to work with stakeholders to develop biosecurity plans, premises registrations and Secure Food Supply plans (Secure Beef, Secure Pork, Secure Poultry, Secure Milk, and Secure Sheep and Wool) that will help keep continuity of business in the event of a disease outbreak. MDA staff members are participating in national and regional FAD exercises, allowing existing emergency plans to be updated to meet current policies and protocols.

#### High Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in Missouri 2022-2023 Updates:

<u>Spring 2022</u> HPAI was detected in 6 commercial poultry farms and 3 Backyard Flocks (BYF) non-poultry with mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. All 9 of these premises have completed virus elimination and have been released from quarantine.

<u>Fall 2022</u> HPAI was detected in 2 commercial poultry farms, 5 Backyard Flocks (BYF) non-poultry with mixed species of poultry and waterfowl and 1 BYF poultry with egg laying chickens. The 2 commercial and 1 BYF non poultry have completed virus elimination and have been released from quarantine. The remaining 4 BYF's non poultry and 1 BYF poultry are finishing their 120 day fallow period (virus elimination) and are scheduled to be released from quarantine in March and April 2023.

<u>Winter 2023</u> HPAI was detected in 3 BYF's non-poultry with poultry or mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. These 3 BYF's are following a 120 day fallow period (virus elimination) and are scheduled to be released from quarantine in May, June and July 2023.

<u>Spring 2023</u> HPAI was detected in 3 BYF's non-poultry with poultry or mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. This BYF is following a 120 day fallow period and is scheduled to be released from quarantine in mid-September 2023.

BYF non-poultry = no poultry or poultry products (eggs) were sold off the farm. No Control Area is required.

BYF poultry = poultry or poultry products (eggs) were sold off the farm. A Control Area is established requiring permitted movement in and out of the Control Area.

These infections of HPAI resulted in the death or depopulation of 449,426 commercial poultry and 10,158 backyard poultry and domestic waterfowl in Missouri. International trade was

impacted for more than six months in 2022 due to HPAI detections in commercial poultry resulting in some countries banning poultry products from Missouri.

African Swine Fever (ASF) was detected for the first time in more than 40 years in the western hemisphere. ASF was confirmed in the Dominican Republic (DR) on July 28, 2021 in several backyard swine herds and on Sept. 20, 2021 in Haiti in several backyard swine herds. USDA APHIS continues to have increased measures to keep ASF out of the US Territories (Puerto Rico (PR) & US Virgin Islands, along with the Continental United States. These measures include: Enhanced Surveillance Programs, Euthanizing Feral Swine, Inspection of vessels and landing locations including illegal boat landings (majority of landings in PR are from DR), Inspections of Garbage Feeders, Beagle Brigade-The Custom & Border Protection performing inspections of passengers and luggage arriving from ASF positive countries, and Awareness Programs, Outreach, & Education.

**Drought 2023:** Currently, more than 93% of Missouri is experiencing some level of drought, with 15% of the state experiencing extreme drought. MDA continues to work with other Missouri State agencies, federal agencies, grain associations and livestock associations to monitor and mitigate drought conditions throughout Missouri. MDA is recommending land owners use the Condition Monitoring Observer Reports (CMOR) system to report drought related conditions and impacts of their property along with pictures to the National Drought Mitigation Center, based at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln at <a href="https://bit.ly/3aKBem">https://bit.ly/3aKBem</a>. 


## DPS Grant Updates

  - The NCSR typically opens in October with a deadline of December 31





    - Must have staff participating in the CTO program to be eligible
    - Award maximum of \$7,500





## **Cybersecurity Program Updates**

- Cybersecurity Distribution List
  - As of June 28, 550 members, from 15 sectors.
- 2023 Statistics (as of May 31)
  - DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Team disseminated 45 intelligence products
  - DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Team assisted with 143 requests for information, including vulnerability notifications
  - DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Team held 70 training and outreach sessions, including tabletop exercise and incident response report writing workshops.
    - DPS/OHS conducted 6 tabletop exercises with the Education, Higher Education, County, State, and Private Sectors. We include partners from FBI, USSS, CISA, STLFC, KCRFC and MOREnet





## Cybersecurity Program Updates

- DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Team & OA SOC were notified of 137 leaked credentials and plain text passwords were available in multiple data breaches. - □ DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Specialist hosted the annual ESF 14 functional exercise with CISA on 04/04/23, including an After-Action meeting from the CISA ESF #14 Exercise for feedback regarding the exercise that took place 04/11/23.
- DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Specialists assisted a school district with bomb threats, by researching indicators of compromise on 04/26/23 & 04/27/23.
- □ DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Specialist joined St. Louis Fusion Center for a Meeting with the Department of State and French Diplomats on creating a cybersecurity program on 05/12/23.
- DPS/OHS Cybersecurity Team identified and notified Missouri entitles that were susceptible to the VMWare, 3CX, and MOVEit vulnerabilities and more.



#### **MOSWIN System Activities**

#### **Governor Parson Announces Emergency Water and Hay Access for Farmers**

(**JEFFERSON CITY, MO**) – Today, in response to worsening drought conditions throughout the state and upon the advice of the Missouri Drought Assessment Committee, Governor Mike Parson announced the availability and process for Missouri family farms to obtain emergency hay and water:

- Boat ramps at 25 Missouri state parks will be open for farmers to collect water with almost 700 acres available for haying at 17 state parks.
- Boat ramps at 36 Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) areas are also now open for water collection.
- The Missouri Department of Transporation (MoDOT) is offering special overwidth hauling permits at no charge to help farmers and ranchers move hay.

"As drought conditions continue to deteriorate across Missouri, we want to do all we can to help our family farms mitigate the devastating effects of severe drought," **Governor Parson** said. "With the current water deficit, we know it will take a lot of rain for our state and its agricultural community to recover from the drought. While our prayers for rain continue, state government will do its part to assist wherever and whenever it can."

Water may be accessed from state park and MDC boat launches and water access points during normal operational hours. Contacting MDC area managers prior to collecting water from conservation areas is required. Water is available for livestock needs only and not for resale. Farmers will need to provide their own pumping and hauling equipment. Contact information and a map displaying locations to pump water from state boat ramps is available at <a href="mailto:dnr.mo.gov/drought">dnr.mo.gov/drought</a>.

Missouri state parks with haying opportunities are available to view online at <a href="mostateparks.com/drought">mostateparks.com/drought</a>. Anyone interested in obtaining hay from these locations can contact the park superintendent to view the designated area. The first person who views the area and wants the hay will be issued a license to cut the hay at no cost. Guidelines and boundaries for cutting the hay on state park property will be provided at that time. Signing a license is required before haying can begin. Missouri State Parks will allow haying on or after June 25, and hay must be removed before Sept. 25.

In addition to the contracts already in place on some conservation areas across Missouri, other opportunities to cut hay on conservation areas might be available to assist farmers in need of hay to harvest. Anyone wanting to inquire about cutting hay on conservation areas should contact their local MDC regional office. Details for each of these regional offices can be found on MDC's website at mdc.mo.gov/contact-engage/regional-mdc-offices.

Special hay hauling permits can be requested through the MoDOT Carrier Express online service, located at <a href="www.modot.org/mce">www.modot.org/mce</a>. MoDOT permits cover movement within Missouri only and are required for each truck. Questions may be directed to MoDOT's Motor Carrier Services office at 1-800-877-8499.

"These drought relief opportunities for Missouri landowners are proactive measures to help our state prepare for and respond to the effects of drought," **Dru Buntin, director of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources** said. "We will continue to monitor environmental impacts to public water supplies and plan for various drought scenarios to ensure we are prepared as conditions change."

On May 31, Governor Parson issued Executive Order 23-05, declaring a drought alert for 60 Missouri counties. Continuing hot, dry weather means drought conditions are expected to further degrade heading into summer. Other counties will be added to the alert and be eligible for assistance as they reach established drought thresholds.

Residents are encouraged to assist local, state, and national decision makers better understand drought conditions in their area by submitting a survey form via the Condition Monitoring Observer Reports (CMOR) service linked via <a href="mailto:dnr.mo.gov/drought">dnr.mo.gov/drought</a>.

The Missouri Department of Conservation also warns of the increased risk for wildfires that drought conditions can cause. #### **MISSOURI DISASTER ASSISTANCE GRANT (MDAG)**

#### **PROGRAM SUMMARY**

Applications Due: 30 days from date of incident

**Eligible Applicants: Political Subdivisions (city or county)** 

**Application Process:** SEMA is making the Missouri Disaster Assistance Grant (MDAG) application opportunity available through <u>WebGrants</u>, an on-line internet portal for electronic grants management. First-time users will need to register their organization and get approval from SEMA prior to beginning the application process. Registration approval within WebGrants is not automatic and is subject to review and must be approved by a SEMA authorized user. The WebGrants portal is open for registration at <a href="https://dpsgrants.dps.mo.gov">https://dpsgrants.dps.mo.gov</a>.

The MDAG is a reimbursement grant: Any approved expenditures must be made within the contract period. Subrecipients must incur an allowable expense, make payment, and seek reimbursement within 90 days of the completion of the scope of work. Reimbursement requests beyond 90 days will not be reimbursed unless granted of an extension by a SEMA Authorized Representative. Extension requests must be submitted in writing to the SEMA Grant Specialist by 15 days prior to the deadline.

Cost Share and Match: 50%/50% (State and Local) – 50% State cost share of <u>up to \$200,000.00</u>. Only hard match will be accepted for this grant program.

This funding is specifically for non-federally declared Stafford Act events that do not meet state or county thresholds for federal assistance.

#### **Not Allowable Costs:**

- Indirect Costs
- Management and Administration (M&A)
- Removal of debris/materials related to construction, repair, or renovation of either residential or commercial structures is ineligible as it pertains to private or commercially owned property.
- SEMA does not fund removal of broken limbs or branches located on trails, sidewalks, playgrounds, parks or private property. Only the minimum cut necessary to remove the hazard is eligible.

#### **Allowable Costs:**

- Debris removal activities: such as clearance, removal, and disposal includes vegetative debris, construction and demolition debris, sand, mud, silt, gravel, rocks, boulders, white good, and vehicle and vessel wreckage as it pertains to public roadways and/or right of ways if threat to public safety.
- **Hazardous Limbs, Trees, and Stumps:** Eligible vegetative debris may include tree limbs, branches, stumps, or trees that are still in place, but damaged to the extent they pose an immediate threat (these items are <u>ineligible</u> if the hazard existed <u>prior</u> to the incident, or if the item does not extend over the public roadway posing an immediate threat).
- **Tree Removal:** is allowable only if the tree has a diameter or 6 inches or greater measured 4.5 feet above ground level and the tree has:

- 1.) A split trunk
- 2.) A broken canopy or
- 3.) Is leaning at an angle greater than 30 degrees that will directly impact a public roadway should it break or fall. Grinding any residual stump after cutting tree or complete stump removal is ineligible.
  - **Privately Owned Vehicles and Vessels on Public Roadways:** Removal of privately-owned vehicles and vessels from public roadways is eligible if all the following conditions are met:
    - The vehicle or vessel blocks access to the public roadway;
    - The vehicle or vessel is abandoned;
    - The Applicant follows applicable state and local government ordinances or laws for private vehicle or vessel removal; and
    - o The Applicant documents the handling of the vehicle or vessel.
    - o The Applicant needs to retain documentation to support it met these criteria.
  - Disposal: To minimize the use of landfill space, SEMA encourages the Applicant to reduce the volume
    of vegetative debris before burying. Costs to reduce vegetative debris using methods such as mulching,
    grinding, or burning are eligible.

## SEMA Quarterly Regional Meeting Missouri Department of Agriculture Update

**Foreign Animal Disease (FAD) Preparedness and Response**: African Swine Fever virus, Foot & Mouth Disease virus and High Pathogenic Avian Influenza virus are three major viruses circulating in the world that could devastate the Missouri poultry and livestock industries. MDA is continuing to work with stakeholders to develop biosecurity plans, premises registrations and Secure Food Supply plans (Secure Beef, Secure Pork, Secure Poultry, Secure Milk, and Secure Sheep and Wool) that will help keep continuity of business in the event of a disease outbreak. MDA staff members are participating in national and regional FAD exercises, allowing existing emergency plans to be updated to meet current policies and protocols.

#### High Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in Missouri 2022-2023 Updates:

<u>Spring 2022</u> HPAI was detected in 6 commercial poultry farms and 3 Backyard Flocks (BYF) non-poultry with mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. All 9 of these premises have completed virus elimination and have been released from quarantine.

<u>Fall 2022</u> HPAI was detected in 2 commercial poultry farms, 5 Backyard Flocks (BYF) non-poultry with mixed species of poultry and waterfowl and 1 BYF poultry with egg laying chickens. The 2 commercial and 1 BYF non poultry have completed virus elimination and have been released from quarantine. The remaining 4 BYF's non poultry and 1 BYF poultry are finishing their 120 day fallow period (virus elimination) and are scheduled to be released from quarantine in March and April 2023.

<u>Winter 2023</u> HPAI was detected in 3 BYF's non-poultry with poultry or mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. These 3 BYF's are following a 120 day fallow period (virus elimination) and are scheduled to be released from quarantine in May, June and July 2023.

<u>Spring 2023</u> HPAI was detected in 3 BYF's non-poultry with poultry or mixed species of poultry and waterfowl. This BYF is following a 120 day fallow period and is scheduled to be released from quarantine in mid-September 2023.

BYF non-poultry = no poultry or poultry products (eggs) were sold off the farm. No Control Area is required.

BYF poultry = poultry or poultry products (eggs) were sold off the farm. A Control Area is established requiring permitted movement in and out of the Control Area.

These infections of HPAI resulted in the death or depopulation of 449,426 commercial poultry and 10,158 backyard poultry and domestic waterfowl in Missouri. International trade was

impacted for more than six months in 2022 due to HPAI detections in commercial poultry resulting in some countries banning poultry products from Missouri.

African Swine Fever (ASF) was detected for the first time in more than 40 years in the western hemisphere. ASF was confirmed in the Dominican Republic (DR) on July 28, 2021 in several backyard swine herds and on Sept. 20, 2021 in Haiti in several backyard swine herds. USDA APHIS continues to have increased measures to keep ASF out of the US Territories (Puerto Rico (PR) & US Virgin Islands, along with the Continental United States. These measures include: Enhanced Surveillance Programs, Euthanizing Feral Swine, Inspection of vessels and landing locations including illegal boat landings (majority of landings in PR are from DR), Inspections of Garbage Feeders, Beagle Brigade-The Custom & Border Protection performing inspections of passengers and luggage arriving from ASF positive countries, and Awareness Programs, Outreach, & Education.

**Drought 2023:** Currently, more than 93% of Missouri is experiencing some level of drought, with 15% of the state experiencing extreme drought. MDA continues to work with other Missouri State agencies, federal agencies, grain associations and livestock associations to monitor and mitigate drought conditions throughout Missouri. MDA is recommending land owners use the Condition Monitoring Observer Reports (CMOR) system to report drought related conditions and impacts of their property along with pictures to the National Drought Mitigation Center, based at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln at <a href="https://bit.ly/3aKBem">https://bit.ly/3aKBem</a>.
